SYNOPSIS OF SCENERY.

ACT I.

Lady Katheryn Howard's Living Room in the Palace of Westminster. A July afternoon in 1540.

ACT II.

A part of the Garden at Hampton Court. Early Autumn in 1541.

ACT III.

Scene 1: A Room in Hampton Court. Six hours later.

Scene 2: A Prison-room in the Tower of London. An evening in February, 1542.

Scene 3: A Room in Hampton Court. Three days later.

Historical Note.—On the death of Cardinal Wolsey, his servant, Thomas Cromwell, wormed himself into the King's favour and speedily became the most cruel and despicable Lord Chancellor this country has seen. He arranged the King's marriage to Anne, the daughter of the Duke of Cleves, as part of his policy to bind Henry VIII to the cause of the German Protestants. This marriage proved so distasteful to the King that Henry forced Anne to agree to an annulment and Cromwell lost his head for his blunder.

The acts of kindness done by Katheryn Howard in the course of the play are not fictions introduced with a view to white-washing a wanton. They are facts. The incident of the block in Act III, Scene 2, and Henry's behaviour at the end of Act III, Scene 1, are also historical. The title of the play is the phrase with which Henry described Katheryn.
